<p>Grade 5 High Ask children to write and illustrate their own myth, drawing inspiration from ancient Greek mythology. They can award their own gods, heroes, and monsters and include moral lessons.</p>	<p>Design in Greek Culture Have children research different types of ancient Greek pottery and then design and decorate their own using clay or by drawing on paper and using paint.</p>	<p>Mythical Games Organise a Greek Olympic tournament at home. Children can create different ancient Greek sports such as running, jumping and discus throwing. They can keep a record of their results and award medals.</p>	<p>Greek Architecture Encourage children to build a model of a famous Greek structure such as the Parthenon or a Greek temple using cardboard, LEGO or other materials.</p>
<p>Reading Information Ask children to write a short play inspired by Greek mythology or a famous Greek story. They can then perform it at home, either to a parent, sister or by using a table. Encourage them to include a moral lesson.</p>	<p>Greek Food Tasting Challenge children to try some Greek cuisine with their parents. They can research traditional dishes like moussaka, souvlaki, baklava, and then prepare and taste them at home.</p>	<p>Greek Alphabet Have children learn the Greek alphabet by creating postcards or a poster with the letters and their corresponding sounds. They can decorate it with pictures and produce writing sample words using the Greek alphabet.</p>	<p>Greek Greek of Stories Encourage children to imagine they are time travellers visiting ancient Greece. They can create a journal with drawings and descriptions of what they see, including things like architecture, clothing, and traditions.</p>

These activities will engage children in different aspects of ancient Greek culture, helping them develop their creativity, research skills, and historical understanding.

If your child completes any of these activities, please bring them to school so we can put them on display and celebrate your child's effort.

Therefore, please see our minimum reading record expectations below:

- Parents are required to sign, initial, or date their child's reading diary **3 times a week**.

As a parent, if you want to write comments about your child's reading in the reading record that is fine but is not essential. The reading diary will serve as a log of the books children have read and accessed at home or in school.
