



Education Healthcare Plan

Means that

The child is recognised as having significant needs, which will be provided for over the long term. The EHC Plan is a legal document that will state what must be provided for the child by the school.

What will happen?

A meeting will be held with parents, school and external agencies to discuss the need for an EHC Plan. A request for an EHC Plan will then be sent to the Local Authority. A meeting will be organised for parents, school, external agencies, health care professionals etc. to discuss the child's strengths and difficulties. If the meeting agrees that an EHC Plan is necessary, then an EHC Plan will be issued that explains exactly what the child needs to make progress. This is a legal document and the school must put in place its recommendations.

How is progress monitored?

- EHC Plans are reviewed every year by parents and the school. The results of the review must be sent to the Local Authority
- Child's progress is assessed at least 3 X a year against expected or better progress
- Parents are invited to review meetings with teacher and SENDco
- Teachers and SENDco discuss the child's progress at Pupil Progress Meetings
- Parents receive a report in Summer
- Parents can meet with external agencies to discuss their child's needs
- Intervention groups have their own targets and children are assessed against these at the end of the intervention. Progress is monitored by class teachers and/or SENDco
